

Dear parents/carers,

I am most delighted to share the outcomes of the recent Ofsted inspection where our pupils and staff received notable praise for teaching and learning here at LFPA. I would like to share some of the well-deserving comments from the Ofsted report with you:

Leaders and staff nurture trusting professional relationships with pupils. Pupils felt confident to speak to a member of staff if they are worried about anything. Leaders follow up pupils' concerns appropriately. This includes resolving concerns about bullying. Pupils are safe and feel safe.

Leaders have high expectations of pupils' behaviour. Pupils behave respectfully. They are considerate of each other's feelings and views. In class, pupils politely thank each other for their opinions, even if they disagree.

Leaders are ambitious for all pupils' achievement. This includes pupils with special needs and/or disabilities (SEND). Leaders work well with teaching staff and external experts to ensure that pupils receive appropriate support.

Attendance Reminders

Lake Farm Park Academy has high expectations for every student from the moment they join our school. Children have the right to a high quality education and we provide this at Lake Farm Park Academy. High attendance is necessary to ensure that your child benefits fully from the learning opportunities on offer and to ensure they leave school having developed positive lifelong habits and as well rounded individuals.

Medical Appointments

Appointments, where possible, should be made outside of school hours or in the holiday period. This includes routine dental appointments. If this is unavoidable, your child should still attend school before or after the appointment where possible. Any session missed that was deemed reasonable to attend will be marked as unauthorised leave.

Absence Requests

Absence requests will only be considered for exceptional circumstances and these are dealt with on an individual basis.

What to do if your child cannot attend school:

Absence must be reported on a daily basis. You must contact the school (**before 9.00am**) on the first day of absence. This can be done by emailing

lfpaoffice@theparkfederation.org or by calling the school number 02085732622 option 1. Please leave the Child's name, class and the reason why they cannot attend school. If they are ill, please give a clear explanation of their condition. **For a prolonged absence due to illness, medical evidence will be requested.** This can be in the form of a prescription, medical paperwork or an appointment card/letter.

How does this affect children?

If your child arrives late in school, he / she misses the teacher's instructions and the introduction to the lesson. They also disturb the learning of other students as the teacher has to acknowledge the lateness and go through the lesson with the child. Did you know how much learning children might miss out due to lateness?

What can we do to help?

Ensure your child arrives on time. Children are able to come onto the school grounds at 8:30am or book them in the breakfast club through Get Active

On 8th September 2022, King Charles III's mother, Queen Elizabeth II, died. This automatically made him King of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth Realms. This is called [ascension](#).

He will be officially given the crown at a special coronation service.

Usually, the coronation of a new king or queen takes place months after their ascension, due to the amount of time it takes for planning and organising such a large event.

King Charles III's coronation service will take place on Saturday 6th May 2023. The service is part of a three-day event when people will come together to celebrate.

A coronation is a service at which a crown is formally placed on the head of a new king or queen, making them the official [monarch](#).

It is a service full of [pageantry](#) and celebration but it also has a solemn religious side. It focuses on the duty of the monarch to God and the people.

Did You Know...?...

The coronation service has been part of British history for over 1000 years. The first recorded coronation service was for King Edgar, in 973. Since 1066, the coronation of every British monarch has been held at Westminster Abbey in London. Westminster Abbey is a large church. It was originally a monastery before King Edward the Confessor had a large stone church built on the site. The church opened in 1065, shortly before King Edward's death. Harold II was the first British monarch to have a coronation at Westminster Abbey, in 1066.

The current building dates back to 1269, when King Henry III decided to rebuild the stone church in a new Gothic style of architecture. The building is now over 750 years old.

Did You Know...?

The coronation of King Charles III will be the 39th coronation to take place in Westminster Abbey.

Since 1066, the service has nearly always been led by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Archbishop of Canterbury is the spiritual head of the Church of England. The Archbishop of Canterbury has to prepare the order of service, lead the service and put the crown on the head of the new monarch. The current Archbishop of Canterbury is the Most Reverend Justin Welby who was [enthroned](#) at Canterbury Cathedral in 2013.

What Will Happen During the Coronation Service?

The coronation service normally follows the same pattern for each king and queen. Queen Elizabeth II's coronation service was around three hours long, with over 8000 people in attendance. King Charles III wants a simpler and shorter service.

The Coronation Oath

King Charles III will make a promise. Although the wording of the oath has varied between monarchs, he will promise to serve the people of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth realms, follow the law, rule the country fairly and to maintain the Church of England.

The Anointing

King Charles III will sit in King Edward's Chair. This is a special chair made in 1300 and present in every coronation since 1308. The Archbishop of Canterbury will use holy oil to make the sign of the cross on The King's hands, chest and head.

Coronation Quiche Recipe

A deep quiche with a crisp, light pastry case and delicate flavours of Spinach, Broad Beans and fresh Tarragon. Eat hot or cold with a green salad and boiled new potatoes - perfect for a Coronation Big Lunch!

x1 20cm Flan Tin

Serves 6

Ingredients

Pastry

- 125g plain flour
- Pinch of salt
- 25g cold butter, diced
- 25g lard
- 2 tablespoons milk
- Or 1 x 250g block of ready-made shortcrust pastry

Filling

- 125ml milk
- 175ml double cream
- 2 medium eggs
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh tarragon.
- Salt and pepper
- 100g grated cheddar cheese.
- 180g cooked spinach, lightly chopped
- 60g cooked broad beans or soya beans






Method

To make the pastry...

1. Sieve the flour and salt into a bowl; add the fats and rub the mixture together using your finger tips until you get a sandy, breadcrumb like texture.
2. Add the milk a little at a time and bring the ingredients together into a dough.
3. Cover and allow to rest in the fridge for 30-45 minutes
4. Lightly flour the work surface and roll out the pastry to a circle a little larger than the top of the tin and approximately 5mm thick.
5. Line the tin with the pastry, taking care not to have any holes or the mixture could leak. Cover and rest for a further 30 minutes in the fridge.
6. Preheat the oven to 190°C.
7. Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper, add baking beans and bake blind for 15 minutes, before removing the greaseproof paper and baking beans.
8. Reduce the oven temperature to 160°C.
9. Beat together the milk, cream, eggs, herbs and seasoning.
10. Scatter 1/2 of the grated cheese in the blind-baked base, top with the chopped spinach and beans and herbs, then pour over the liquid mixture.
11. If required gently give the mixture a delicate stir to ensure the filling is evenly dispersed but be careful not to damage the pastry case.
12. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Place into the oven and bake for 20-25 minutes until set and lightly golden.

Note:

- Depending of the severity of the event, Welfare team will make a judgement and call the parent/career.
- No action will be taken if the child has not informed any adult of an accident or incident.
- In some cases we will not be able to share the details of the accident as this has not been shared with the Welfare team by the child.
- In the case of vomiting or loose motions, the child can return to school only 24 hours after their last sickness or loose motion.
- The Welfare team are not medical professionals and we strongly encourage you to seek medical advice where appropriate.
